Kathy Morris and I used the collection of model ships to show the children what vessels were like in the past. We went on to tell the stories of two vessels with Topsham connections. Our new display on HMS Terror and the freshly-refurbished Town Model helped to explain how Topsham built outstanding ships. Everyone had an enjoyable morning before the children left for Topsham School, where their coach was waiting for them.

Winter Conservation Work

Work has been carried out on the town model to repair damaged parts and to stabilise the trees, hedges and fields. Built in 1982, it had become quite frail and the recent work will extend its life. It is one of the best loved features in the museum and is a constant attraction for both visitors and residents.

Exeter City Council have inserted new lintels above the windows in the Parlour, which is why the front of the Museum has been covered in scaffolding recently. Dry rot has (yet again) been dealt with in the Local History Room, which has recently been redecorated and re-furnished.

The first lecture of the year on Tuesday 28th April will be given by Topsham resident, Professor Valerie Maxfield and is entitled "Re-visiting Exeter's Roman Baths — current plans to display the legionary baths". It is ten years since Professor Maxfield last spoke to us on this subject and it is hard to believe that it is really 40 years since many of us watched the progress of the excavations (pictured on the left). You will have read recent reports in the newspaper about the plans to open them up for display — and are perhaps puzzled as to how this can be achieved.

The lecture on Tuesday 26th May will be given by Professor Sam Smiles (pictured on the left), who will talk to us about the Newlyn School and other art colonies of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Their portrayal of fishermen and the ordinary working life of the harbours and villages remain popular pictures with historic as well as artistic interest. Later lectures will be linked to exhibitions that are planned for the museum on the themes of "Crossing the Exe, Topsham's Ferry and River Exe Bridges" and, in conjunction with the RSPB, on the wildlife seen on the River Exe. Local History

Commemoration of the Death of Paul Holman, Hon. Artillery Company

As part of the Dawlish World War I project, a Service of Commemoration was held at the Dawlish Methodist Church on 15 February to mark the centenary of Paul Holman's death. Paul, who was Dorothy Holman's brother, was killed whilst on sentry duty outside the billets at Locre when he was hit by a "stray shot". His grave is at Ypres Salient. The family received and "enormous pile" of condolence letters from friends and relatives. He was included in the Dawlish project because his name is on the Dawlish War Memorial and at that time the Holman family owned Holcombe Down, near Dawlish.

Could any members help us to positively identify the buildings shown in the photograph (left) which forms part of the Cecil Holman Collection?

Did any of your family live or work in Topsham during the First World War? There will be a special exhibition at the Museum next year and we do need your help! There must be many fascinating and moving stories concerning local people which deserve to be recorded, so your contributions, photographs, stories and any other information would be very welcome. We look forward to hearing from you!

2015 Exhibitions

We have three exhibition spaces which we are using for seasonal and guest exhibitions, as well as displaying pictures from our reserve store.

The first exhibition in the local history room celebrates the fifty years in which the Topsham Society has been in existence, showing some of its achievements and concerns. In July this will change to "*Wild about Topsham*", showing the wildlife, flora and geology of our area. The Entwistle room will revisit the displays about the Civil War, and the connections with Monmouth and William Orange and will be replaced in June by an exhibition called "*Crossing the Exe*". The Tearoom will initially show a selling exhibition of Topsham and estuary scenes before pictures from the reserve store are revealed. Meanwhile, in the Sail Loft the restored model and history of *HMS Terror*" continues to be of great interest, as will a small exhibition about some of the Topsham schools. Changes in the **Period House** have been kept to a minimum for 2015 but maintenance work is always ongoing.

The Local History Room has a completely new look. It has been refurnished, using a lovely partners desk and an antique glass-fronted bookcase that was formerly on the top floor, creating an attractive and welcoming area conducive to research, browsing and networking as well as showcasing our seasonal exhibitions. As well as the family history information, there is now an enormous amount of local history research accumulating in the files in that room, together with the reference books we have now been able to bring down from the second floor. Please contact us if you would like to help us build up this information. Members are also encouraged to use the computer for research and our subscription to Findmypast.
